


VOLUNTARY OCEAN COMMITMENTS

Initiative taken by various constituencies to contribute to the implementation of SDG 14 by addressing one or several of its targets, which also often achieve associated positive impact (inter-linkages) on other SDGs.

Registration of VC was opened on 15 Feb 2017, ahead of the first ever UN Ocean Conference held at UNHQ from 5-9 Jun 2017

A key outcome of the 2017 UNOC and have become one of its most important legacies





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

Description

Beyond Plastic Med (BeMed) is a Monegasque law association BeMed that brings together the Prince Albert II of Monaco Foundation, the Tara Ocean Foundation, Surfrider Foundation Europe, the MAVA Foundation and the IUCN. It aims to reduce plastic pollution in the Mediterranean by mobilizing and supporting stakeholders, facilitating the implementation of effective and sustainable solutions and encouraging the sharing of experience and best practices. BeMed supports projects each year to reduce the use of plastic, find alternatives, improve waste collection systems, raise awareness, collect data and help implement new regulations. BeMed has already supported 69 projects in 14 different countries and aims to support 13 new initiatives for its 2022 call for micro-initiatives. Through the coordination of this network of local


Assessment of the Impacts of the United Nations Ocean Conference Voluntary Commitments







Large number of grassroots initiatives to collect marine litter from beaches and underwater; bans on single-use plastic



Science is advancing novel approaches for ocean issues;
Networks of scientific cooperation are resulting in capacity development and technology transfer



New approaches to working together and enable cross-sectoral ocean governance

Reporting on voluntary commitments

- Main difficulty: Low rate of reporting (rate ~24% overall)
- Commitments not reporting are likely still making progress, though some have now concluded
- Gaps in reporting make it more difficult to assess contribution towards specific targets and SDG 14 overall
- "Other relevant actors" highest reporting (48%), UN entities (39%), CSO (18%), Gov't (17%), Philanthropic (14%)
- Progress reports include all targets



Assessment of the Impacts of the United Nations Ocean Conference Voluntary Commitments

Lessons learned & Challenges

- Progress is not made at a scale that is large enough to make a real difference for the ocean and its biodiversity.
- Partnerships and networking are ways of scaling up successful initiatives, and to bring in new ideas and develop capacity where it is needed.
- Sustainable, shock-proof and long-term funding is essential for achieving Goal 14
- Future commitments should incorporate simple monitoring, with a baseline and agreed-upon metrics for easier assessment





Assessment of the Impacts of the United Nations Ocean Conference Voluntary Commitments

Areas that may require further attention in VCs (1)

14.1	 Need to address all aspects of plastics supply chain global assistance and coordination is needed to provide a coherent response Further action required on other forms of pollution, such as nutrients and sewage 	
14.2	 Scaling up implementation of an ecosystem approach Scaling up efforts relating to restoration and rehabilitation of coastal and marine ecosystems, including blue carbon Further addressing the component of this target relating to "avoiding significant adverse impacts" Further efforts towards joint implementation of Goals 13 and 14 	
14.3	 Awareness raising and education, including among policymakers, relating to the importance of monitoring and addressing ocean acidification Filling geographical gaps in ocean acidification observations around the world Further addressing adaptation to ocean acidification, including socioeconomic aspects, restoration (blue carbon), and marine protection Developing further initiatives towards addressing ocean acidification, and in particular reduction of CO2 emissions, through the implementation of Goal 13 and in the work of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change 	

Areas that may require further attention in VCs (2)

Target	Areas requiring further attention
14.4	 Scaling up successful efforts towards fisheries sustainability Issues related to related the reduction of pre- and post-harvest loss and waste Human rights issues related to fisheries More work to transition to ecosystem-based fisheries management; to improve international and regional governance mechanisms such as regional fishery bodies (including collaboration between regional fishery bodies and regional seas programmes); apply market-based mechanisms; and to incorporate climate change into fisheries management
14.5	 Addressing gaps in ecological representativity, functionality and connectivity of existing marine protected areas nationally, regionally and globally Marine protected area design in the context of climate change Marine protected area design for open ocean areas, including dynamic areas Further work on management effectiveness, capacity and long-term financing Monitoring the ecological and socio-economic impacts of marine protected areas
14.6	Further improving the informational basis on fisheries subsidies and their impacts to inform WTO negotiations

Areas that may require further attention in VCs (3)

Target	Areas requiring further attention
14.7 14.A	 Gaps in sectoral representation in blue economies, including marine biotechnology, sustainable aquaculture and renewable/sustainable energy production Gaps in capacity and technology, including both human and institutional capacity, that can be addressed through long-term partnerships and mentoring relationships Gaps in available socioeconomic information relating to the ocean Gaps in biodiversity information in some undersurveyed regions, for certain species types, as well as the deep sea
14.B	 The implementation of this target requires further action across a broader range of countries, particularly in developing countries and in small island developing States
14.C	 Many stakeholders will likely require further assistance in better understanding and implementing the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea

How to register?

- Check the appropriate link considering the status of your organization (ECOSOC accredited/Specially Accredited)
- Each participant will need to **set up a profile on the INDICO** platform through a specific email.
- Be prepared to upload a picture for the badge
- Letter of Representation From the Head of your organization indicating that you are authorized to represent the organization at the 2022 UN Ocean Conference
- Submit your registration as early as possible!
- Approved participants will receive a letter from the system that can be used to seek for Visas (if appropriate)



Registration Process

- Representatives of accredited organizations **MUST request pre-registration** using the appropriate online forms.
- Up to 3 representatives per accredited organization
- Deadline for registration: 16 May 2022
- Important!
 - Registrations via email will not be accepted
 - o In site registration will not be accepted
 - Incomplete registrations or with insufficient documentation will not be accepted.
 - Registrations past the deadline will not be accepted.
