



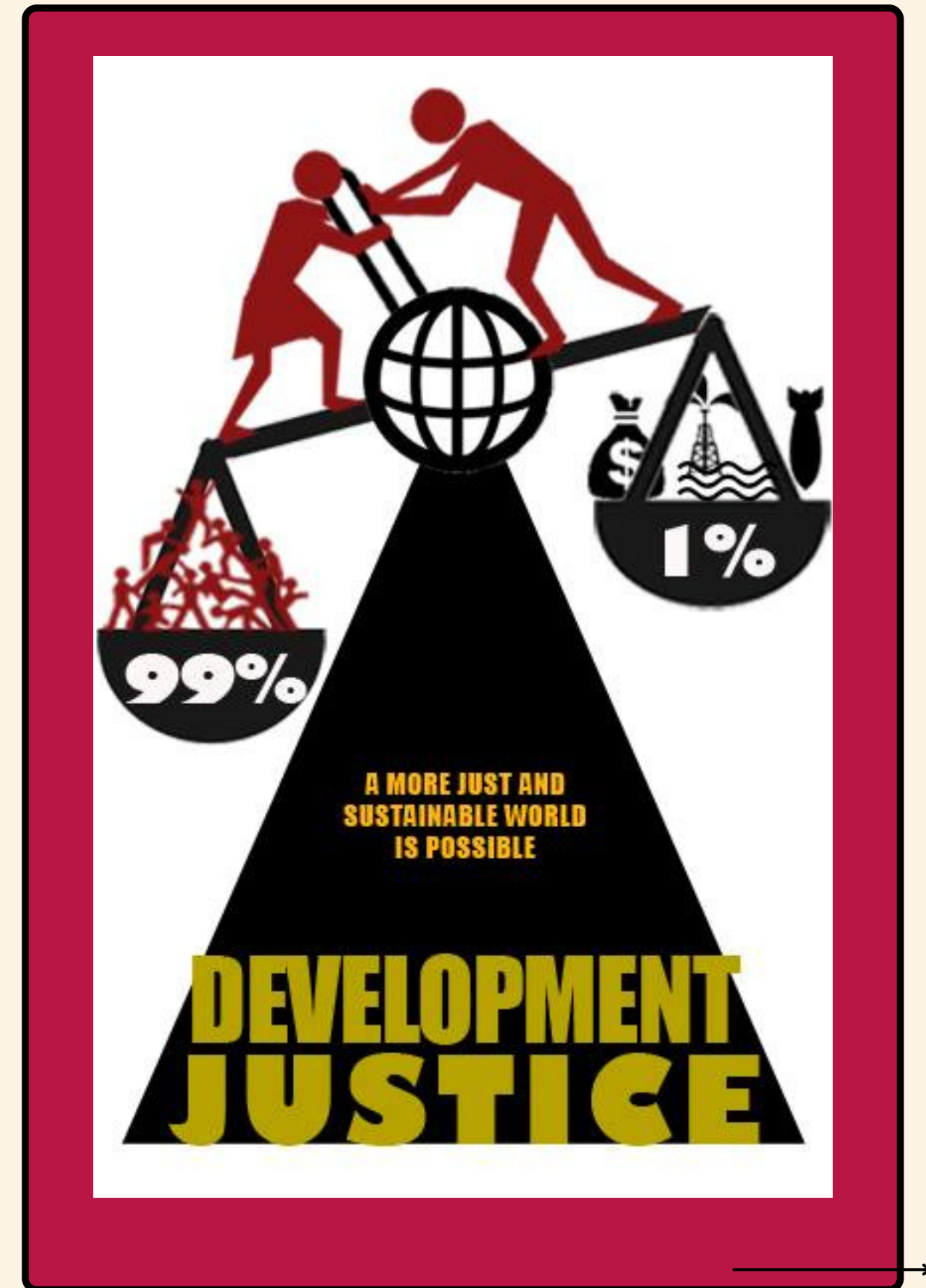

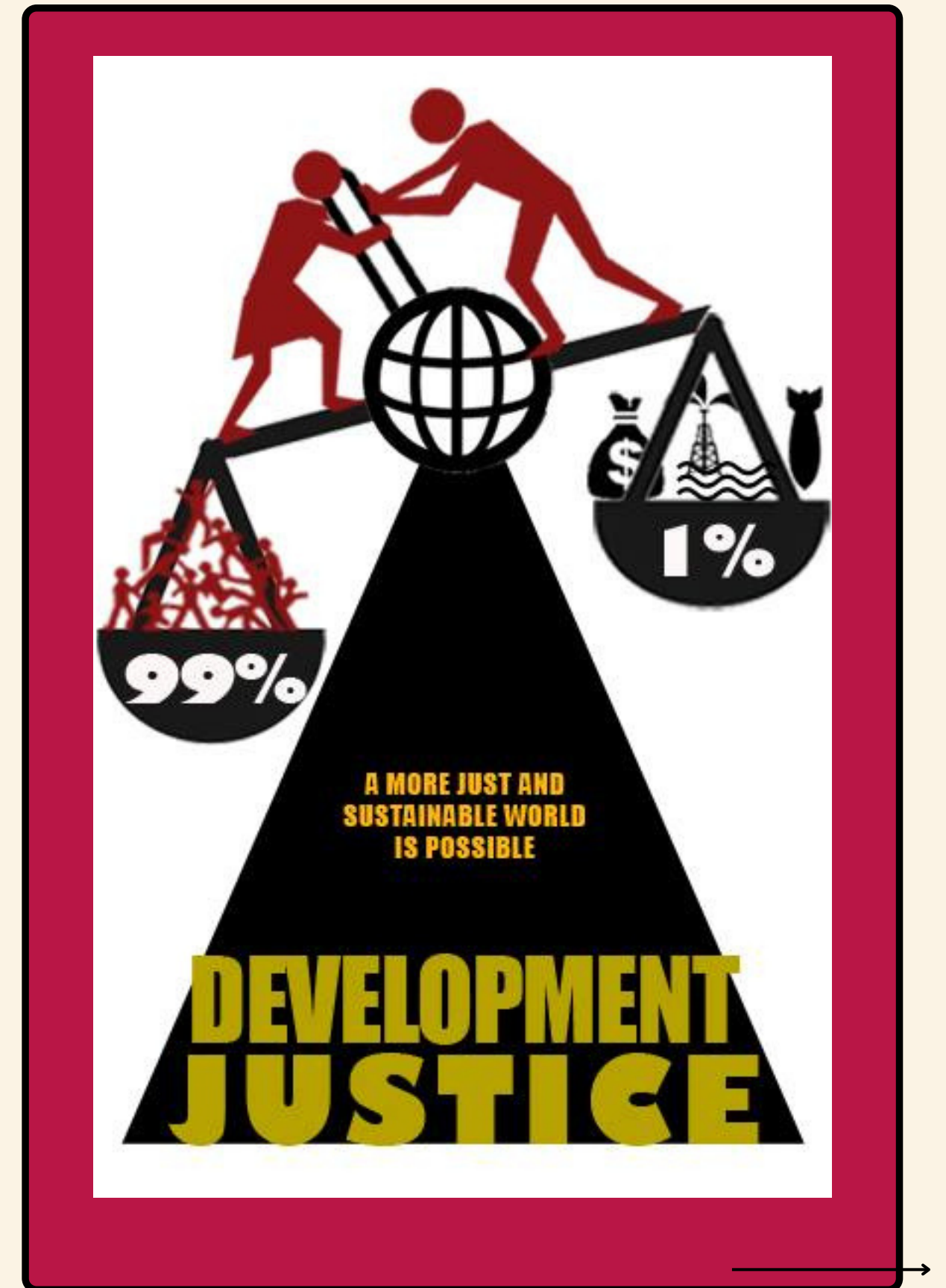
Why DEVELOPMENT JUSTICE

- The 2030 Agenda fails to address financial commitments and resources.



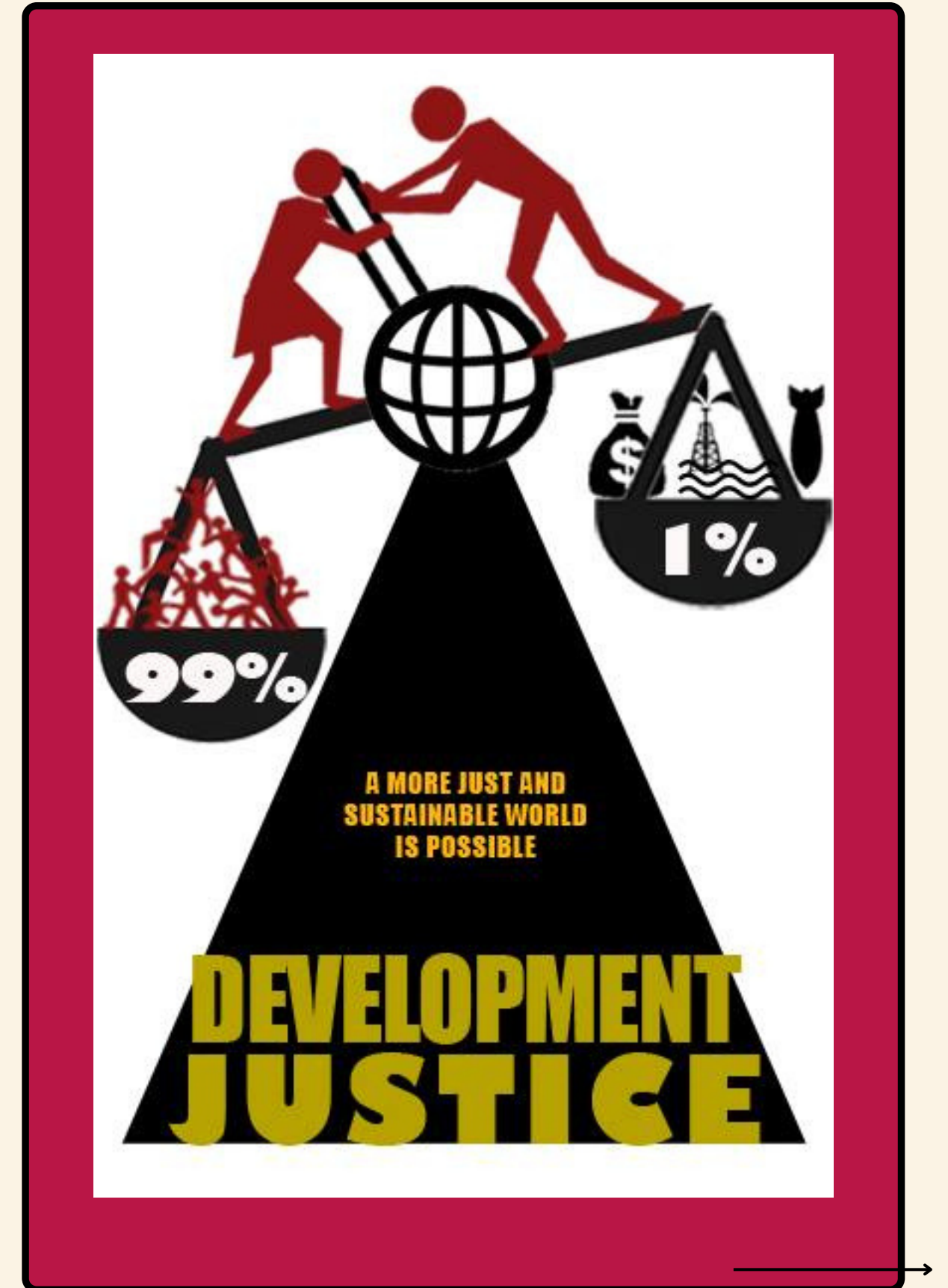
What is **DEVELOPMENT JUSTICE**

A transformative development framework that addresses the structural causes of inequalities and fulfills promises to women's human rights through the five transformative shifts (1) Redistributive Justice (2) Economic Justice (3) Social and Gender Justice (4) Environmental Justice, and (5) Accountability to Peoples.



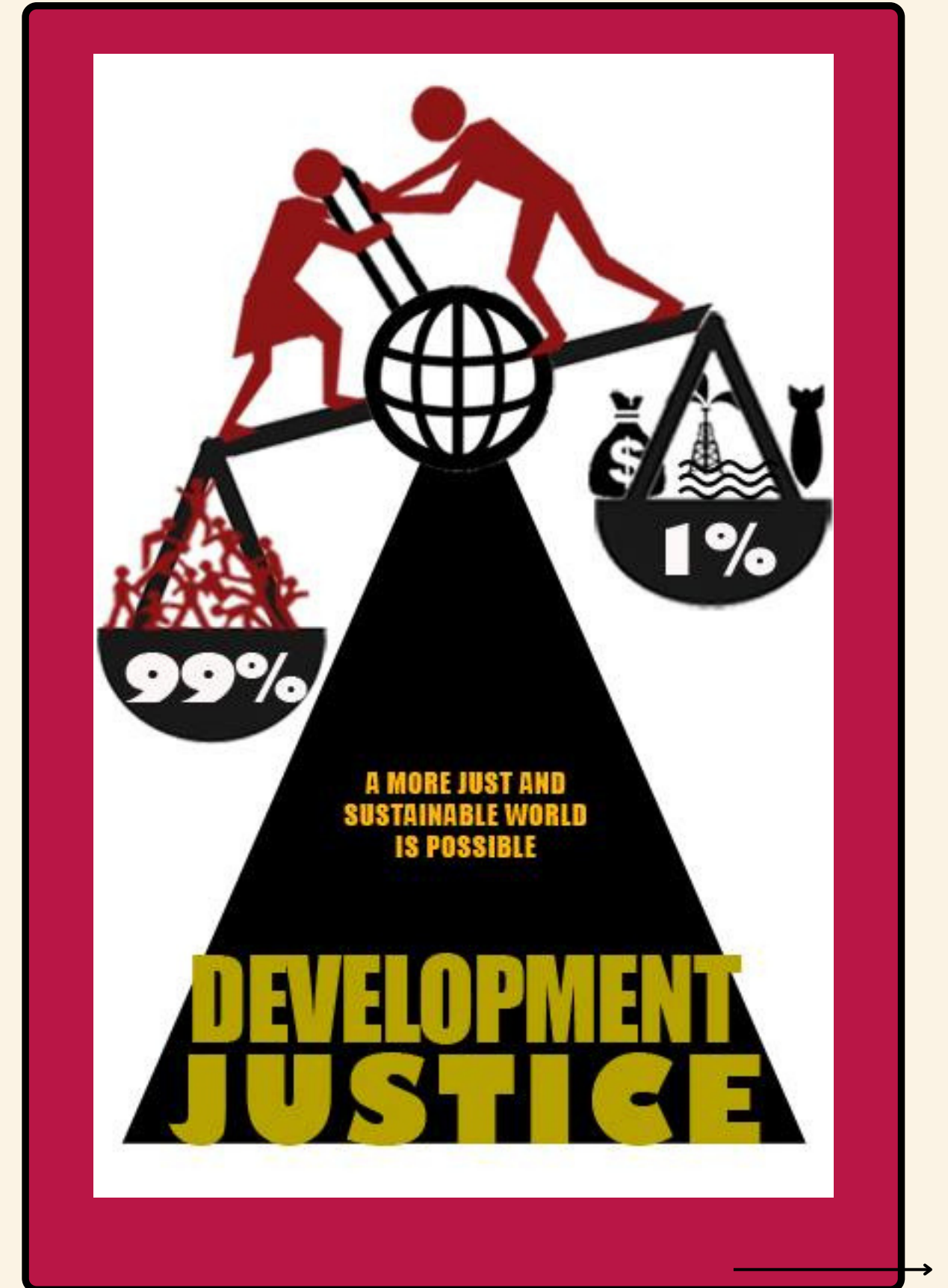
How do we deliver **DEVELOPMENT JUSTICE**

By **building capacity** and **provide resources and tools** to national and local feminist and women's rights organisations to produce their own analysis, critique and provide recommendation on their government's commitments and implementations of the SDGs using Development Justice as a framework.



Feminist **DEVELOPMENT JUSTICE** *Monitoring*

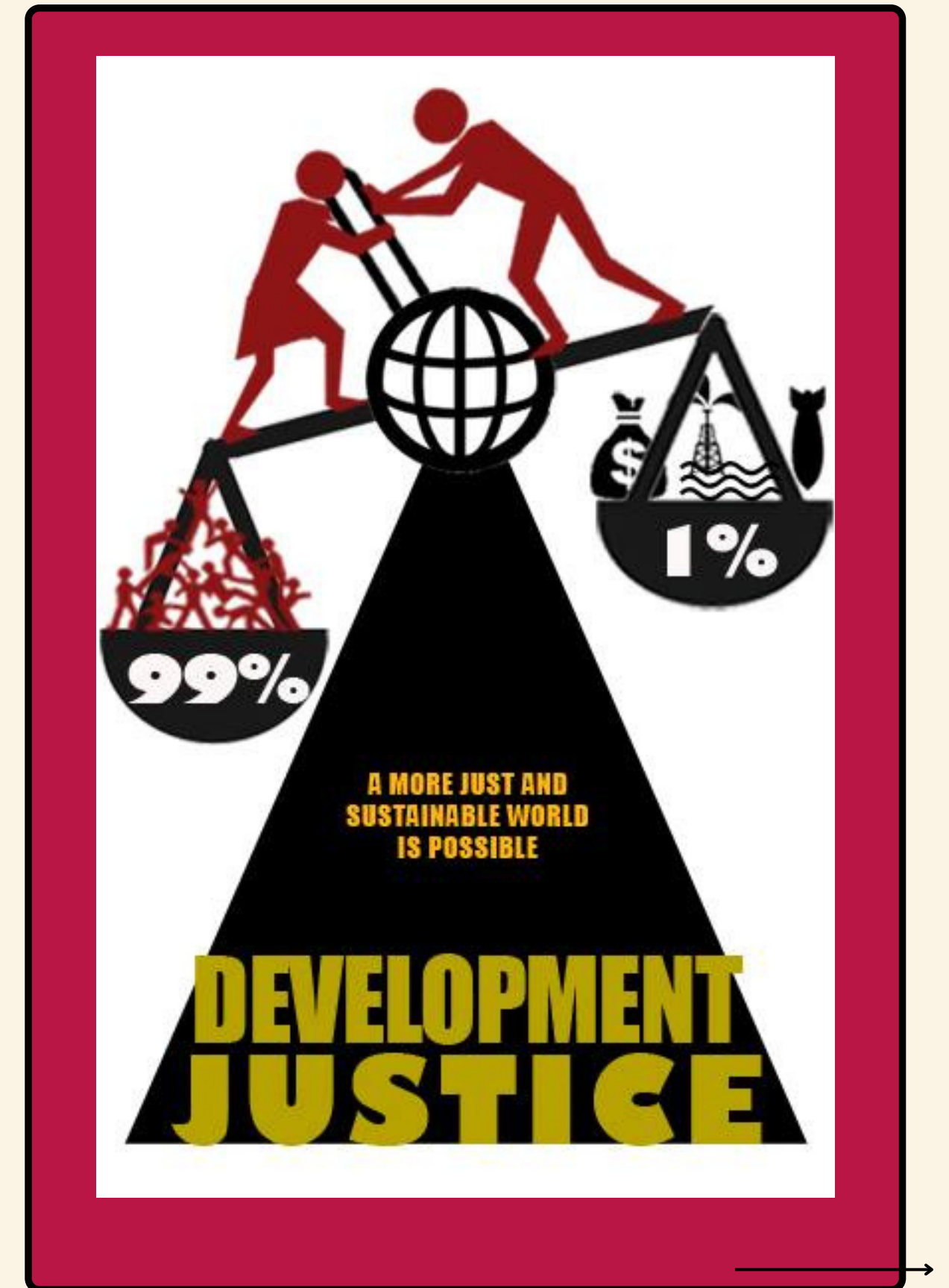
- It is a partnership based on the communities' needs, capacities and issues they work on;
- In the process, a series of indicators is being developed based on qualitative measurement such as quality of life, access to services and justice etc.;
- The programme also aims to develop capacities of grassroots women to research, advocacy work and campaign.



Feminist **DEVELOPMENT JUSTICE**

Monitoring

- In the process, women are able to deep dive on particular issues in their countries including government programmes and/or situations of women;
- Women are equipped with analysis on the root causes of these challenges;
- Women are also able to engage their governments, multilateral institutions such as the UN, etc.;
- Women are also able to strengthen their movements, and build solidarity.



Feminist **DEVELOPMENT JUSTICE** *Monitoring*

Some of the common findings among FDJ Monitoring partners in the previous years:

- Lack of access of women to services;
- Lack of data;
- Lack of participation of women;
- Lack of gender-sensitive and appropriate programmes for women;
- Lack of access to justice.
