Global Sustainable Development Report 2023 Regional Dissemination Workshop for Asia and the Pacific

Concept Note

October 22nd – 24th 2024, Delhi

Background

The Global Sustainable Development Report (GSDR) was originally mandated by the United Nations Member States in the outcome document of the 2012 "Rio +20" conference on sustainable development, "The Future We Want". Three years later, as part of the 2030 Agenda, Member States reaffirmed the importance of the GSDR and requested in 2016 that it would be written by an independent group of scientists (IGS). The first report was published in 2019.

The IGS, appointed by the United Nations Secretary-General, consists of 15 leading experts from the natural and social sciences, representing developed and developing countries. The 2023 group was cochaired by Prof. Imme Scholz of Germany and Prof. J. Jaime Miranda of Peru.

The GSDR 2023 arrived at the halfway point of the 2030 Agenda, when the world was far off track in its quest to achieve the SDGs. Building on the GSDR 2019, the report discusses essential transformations within the **six entry points**: 1) human wellbeing and capabilities, 2) sustainable and just economies, 3) food systems and healthy nutrition, 4) energy decarbonization with universal access, 5) urban and periurban development, and 6) the global environmental commons. Multiple transformations will need to occur in each of these entry points. These transformations will have different contours depending on the country and region. Building on the GSDR 2019, the GSDR 2023 identifies **five levers**, that will drive transformation— 1) governance, 2) economy and finance, 3) science and technology, 4) individual and collective action, and – as additional lever in 2023 - 5) capacity building.

Following an objective assessment of the evidence, GSDR 2023 highlights the significant role of science-backed transformation towards achieving the 2030 Agenda. It finds that strategies for the SDGs must identify and minimize impediments and support promising solutions specific to different phases of transformation – emergence, acceleration and stabilization. This requires applying levers strategically and changing approaches over time to encourage the 'emergence' of new technologies, practices and initiatives through experimentation and learning; to support their 'acceleration' and scale-up with just transitions, collective action and political momentum; and to ultimately enable 'stabilization' of a new normal anchored in regulations, behaviour change and new infrastructures.

The GSDR aligns with many other reports showing that business-as-usual approaches to the SDGs must be replaced by transformative approaches operating at a systemic level that address multiple goals simultaneously. Ideally, interventions toward progress on a given target will also generate positive synergies with other targets, while resolving trade-offs. Sustainable development will require fundamental changes in the way societies are governed, and in how they produce, consume, move around, interact and work. These changes will be possible only through effective, inclusive and accountable governance and integrated actions that cut across sectors.

While the report leaves us with a "Call to Action" outlining policy priorities that can ignite progress in each of these entry points and across society at large, it comes with the clear reminder that in order to be successful, interventions for sustainable development "will require contextualized strategies and actions." It provides evidence that the nature of SDG interlinkages varies across groups and regions.

From theory to practice: regional dissemination workshop

The GSDR 2023 regional operationalization workshop in New Delhi, India, is part of a global GSDR dissemination series. The workshop serves two basic purposes: 1) to introduce the GSDR framework to practitioners for national and local SDG policy-making and implementation; 2) to support government











experts and other stakeholders to put the recommendations of the report into practice in Voluntary National Reviews (VNRs) and other national, local and regional sustainable development strategies.

The GSDR Launch for the Asia and the Pacific Region will be held on the morning of 22 October. The opening will involve high-level government officials, while the workshop sessions will focus on building the capacity of technical level decision makers to support transformative change. The workshop participants will include policymakers at all levels, civil society, local communities, youth, academia, and the private sector. The workshop will focus on countries that are preparing VNRs for the High-level political forum (HLPF) in 2025.

The aim of the workshop is to raise awareness about the GSDR in Asia and the Pacific, deepen knowledge of the GSDR framework, its applicability and opportunities. Participants will be encouraged to identify **how to apply the GSDR framework into national policymaking**. The workshop will serve as a platform for joint reflection on what this means for **Voluntary National Review (VNR)** preparation and follow-up processes as well as inputs and feedback-loops into national sustainability processes. Given the complexity of transformation, participants will discuss how to engage various stakeholder groups in the development of transformation plans. Participants will consider the following key questions:

- 1. How can policy cycles of national policy making (Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and VNRs) integrate the 2030 Agenda towards a climate neutral and socially just Asia and the Pacific region in the coming decades?
- 2. What barriers need to be overcome to enable integrated policy making? What are some promising opportunities for supporting transformations in the six entry points highlighted in the GSDR? How might this vary depending on the phase of transition for a given system or country?
- 3. How can stakeholder groups (academia, civil society, private sector and others) support these policy cycles in a meaningful and sustainable way? How can all of the levers needed for transformation be applied in a cohesive manner?
- 4. What is needed to foster connections and collaboration from local to national levels to accelerate key transformations aligned with the 2030 Agenda?
- 5. What institutional adjustments and capacities are needed for integrated and transformative approaches to the SDGS, and effective monitoring and delivery of SDGs in the Asia and Pacific region?

The workshop also **builds upon the results of the 2023 SDG Summit (September 2023)** taking into account the commitments made in the **Political Declaration**, as well as national commitments and commitments to the **High Impact Initiatives** and outcomes of the **Summit of the Future** and their implications for integrated SDG-implementation. The Workshop outcomes could further inform the GSDR 2027 process.
