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



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Introduction

This is the eighth Voluntary Monitoring Report on the Basque Country 2030 agenda, a statistic reflecting a story which dates back to 24 November 2016, when the President of the Basque Government, Iñigo Urkullu, gave his investiture address at the Basque Parliament, proclaiming this commitment to the new global Agenda.

In April 2018, the Basque Government presented the first Voluntary Monitoring Report on the Basque Country 2030 Agenda, covering the year 2017. As an initial step, this report linked the 2030 Agenda goals and targets to the commitments set out in the Government's Programme, making the Basque Country the first subnational government to present such a report, a practice which has continued each year, down to this eighth edition.

Continuing the work undertaken during the 11th Legislature since 2016, in June 2021 the Basque Government approved the **Basque Programme** of 2030 Agenda Priorities for the period 2021-2024.

The programme's mission has been to promote the culture of a social contract centred on commitment to the Sustainable Development Goals. Its main aims have been to help build internal social cohesion, play a part in international best efforts for peace, justice and sustainability, promote policy consistency, and adopt the 2030 Agenda as a commitment driving transformative priorities.

Within this context, the Basque Programme of 2030 Agenda Priorities for the period 2021-2024 established 4 strands: outreach, coordination, evaluation and prioritisation. Emphasis should be placed on the coordination strand, involving the creation of the Basque Country 2030 Agenda Forum (multi-level and multi-agent) as the core area for governance and inter-institutional and social collaboration to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals. This Forum brings together the different Departments of the Basque Government, the three Provincial Authorities, EUDEL (Association of Basque Municipalities), the city councils of the three provincial capitals, Basque universities, as well as organisations representing public-private partnership and civil society organisations.

The most notable step forward seen during 2024 was the consolidation of the **Basque SDG Alliance**, with more than 100 organisations signing up to collaborate in developing the 2030 Agenda. The Alliance is based on the Declaration "For a Basque Country 2030 Agenda Social Contract", establishing 5 main commitments regarding which these organisations have formed an alliance for joint progress:

- Strengthen collaboration among social organisations, and between them and institutions.
- Implement the SDGs in the internal functioning and management of companies and organisations.

- Publicise and promote the 2030 Agenda and encourage participation and engagement by citizens.
- Promote the principles of solidarity and sustainability as the foundations of the 2030 Agenda.
- Model the Basque experience and facilitate exchange at the international level.


Another notable aspect of progress is that this eighth Voluntary Monitoring Report is the second to incorporate an overall countrywide perspective. First of all, because the Basque Country's commitment to the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs is an overall commitment involving all institutions and a wide range of social and business agents and Basque citizens themselves, as it is they who help to achieve the SDGs day by day, through their daily actions and decisions. And also because the key distinctive element which the Basque Country aims to present to the world is specifically the added impact that can be achieved through multi-level and multi-agent engagement and collaboration.


Nor should we overlook another highly significant event during 2024, which will benefit not only the Basque Country but also municipalities and regions all round the world in terms of SDG localisation. Following the selection in late 2020 of **Bilbao** as the headquarters of the Local 2030 Coalition Secretariat, 2024 finally saw the launch of this UN office responsible for fostering action by

cities, regional and national governments and the private sector to localise the SDGs and the 2030 Agenda.

We end 2024 by taking stock of the Basque Programme of 2030 Agenda Priorities for the period 2021-2024, and finalising the text of the **2025-2028 Social Innovation and 2030 Agenda Plan**, which will serve as the Road Map guiding efforts to speed up fulfilment of the Sustainable Development Goals through the 2030 Agenda in the Basque Country.

We should lastly point out that one of the **documents annexed** to this 8th Voluntary Monitoring Report **sets out a report containing detailed information as to the Basque 2030 Agenda Sustainable Development Indicators System**, and the most recent data available for each indicator.





Part one

Basque contribution to the global 2030 Agenda in 2023: overview

The following pages set out a summary of the key cross-cutting elements in the Basque Country's contribution to the global 2030 Agenda in 2024.

We have analysed this contribution on the basis of a **prior analysis of the international context within which the global 2030 Agenda developed over the course of 2024**, most notably the Summit of the Future (New York, September 2024), which served to approve a Pact for the Future, including a Global Digital Compact and a Declaration on Future Generations.

This contextual analysis is followed by a **cross-cutting account** of the Basque Country's contribution in 2024 to the global Agenda, explained in terms of the different operational spheres.

1. Appraisal of the international context regarding fulfilment of the 2030 Agenda

In 2019 onwards there was clearly a broad international consensus as to the diagnosis of fulfilment of the SDGs: the process of transformation promoted by the 2030 Agenda was not happening quickly enough, nor was it achieving sufficient impact. In fact, for this very reason in September that year, during the 74th UN General Assembly, Secretary-General António Guterres called on governments, companies and civil society to intensify their efforts towards the global Goals, declaring the next 10 years to be the Decade of Action.

This diagnosis was repeated during the Sustainable Development Goals Summit held in New York in September 2023, at which the agents taking part acknowledged that the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) will not be attained without a huge drive to bring about the investment needed to achieve fair and equitable energy, food and digital transitions, and to transform education and social protection in developing countries. Among other operational approaches, this entailed a renewal of the commitment to multilateralism to seek out new ways of working together and guaranteeing that multilateral institutions keep abreast of the rapid changes occurring, while the 2024 Summit of the Future was established as a major opportunity to speed up implementation of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs.

The **Summit of the Future** held in New York in September 2024 produced 3 instruments (the Future Act, the Global Digital Compact and the Declaration on Future Generations), setting the stage for new opportunities for a sustainable, fair and peaceful world order for all peoples and nations, emphasising essential issues in order to drive forward implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals, such as:

- An agreement to reform international financial architecture so as better to represent and serve developing countries.
- Improve the way in which we measure human progress, going beyond GDP so as to gauge well-being and human and planetary sustainability.
- A commitment to consider ways of bringing in a minimum global level of taxation of high net worth individuals.
- Confirmation of the need to limit the increase in global temperature to

- 1.5° C above pre-industrial levels and to eliminate fossil fuels from energy systems so as to achieve net zero emissions by 2050.
- A commitment to design, use and manage technology for the benefit of all.
- Specific measures to take future generations into account in our decision-making.
- More robust efforts regarding human rights, gender equality and female empowerment.
- Recognition of the importance of involving other stakeholders in global governance, including local and regional governments, civil society, the private sector and others.
- The promise to contribute 1.05 billion dollars to promote digital inclusion.

All these operational approaches will be essential in order to meet the global targets set for 2030.

Meanwhile, the High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development took place in the month of July, under the theme "Reinforcing the 2030 agenda and eradicating poverty in times of multiple crises: the effective delivery of sustainable, resilient and innovative solutions", conducting an in-depth review of the following goals: Goal 1 (No poverty), Goal 2 (Zero hunger), Goal 13 (Climate action), Goal 16 (Peace, justice and strong institutions) and Goal 17 (Partnerships for the goals).

2. An overall analysis of the Basque contribution in 2024

A countrywide commitment to the SDGs

Since 2016, both the institutions and leading social agents of the Basque Country have prioritised the overall commitment represented by the 2030 Agenda, adapting it to our local reality, through an approach of transformation and solidarity. The Basque Country has thus committed to progress towards the 2030 Agenda goals, by promoting development and equality, and consolidating a more inclusive and sustainable future for all, while furthermore launching the instruments needed to translate that commitment into reality.

This commitment is reflected in the document "Model of Basque commitment to the localisation of the SDGs". A model with the following key elements:

Proactive principle

The commitment to the 2030 Agenda means more than simply recognition and formal alignment between internal programmes and the SDGs. It involves asking ourselves how the SDGs change our pre-existing operational approaches and policies. This is where their transformative capacity lies.

Application of concrete methodology

The SDGs require a more concrete and less abstract approach. We need to move on from words to deeds, expressing the goals through concrete projects bringing us closer to fulfilment. This is not about having projects for the 17 Goals, but defining priorities and practical flagship initiatives.

Integration of the concept of "localisation"

- **1. Localisation first of all means a commitment to greater institutionalisation**. In its most practical aspect, it involves structuring at least 4 infrastructures committed to the executive development of the SDGs from the institutional and organisational perspective:
 - Create an executive, cross-cutting management and coordination body for the SDGs, to steer governance by any institution or organisation.
 - Have strategic planning documents in place, including goals, criteria, priorities, action plans, calendars and budgetary alignment.
 - Prepare and use efficient assessment tools, such as indicators aligned with the actual reality, yearly stock-takes or Voluntary Annual Monitoring Reports.
 - Promote models of governance and extensive intra-institutional and social cooperation, fostering involvement in these structures.
- **2.** Localisation secondly means a commitment to greater socialisation. Faced with the reality that much of society is unaware of the SDGs, one priority is to invest resources and efforts focused on helping to showcase the 2030 Agenda and promote involvement by social actors through such instruments as:
 - Communication campaigns or initiatives.
 - Educational courses and publications.
 - Subsidies for social promotion and citizen participation.

- · Educational tools.
- · Specialist training.
- Social cooperation alliances.
- **3. Localisation thirdly means a commitment to greater personalisation**. The 2030 Agenda is likewise a personal appeal affecting our everyday life, both individually and in family or private terms. The institutionalisation and socialisation of the SDGs must take this third dimension into account. Without active and informed participation and engagement by citizens, the future of the Agenda is at risk.

Collaboration as the essential basis for progress towards the SDGs

Collaboration is fundamental in order to progress towards the SDGs. Since the adoption of the 2030 Agenda, it has been acknowledged that no sector can achieve these goals on its own. Collaboration among governments, the private sector, civil society and international organisations is essential to address the complex and global challenges we face.

This collaboration is applied in the Basque Country to the governance of the Agenda itself, to the design and implementation of its transformative projects, and to international action, so as to express the teachings of SDG 17 in terms of concrete initiatives.

Firm action and international collaboration

The localisation of the 2030 Agenda in the Basque Country is seen as an approach which fundamentally relies on the momentum of international action through a belief in collaboration, learning and developing joint initiatives together with other parts of the world.

This commitment was reiterated by the new President of the Basque Government, Imanol Pradales, at the Plenary meeting of the Basque Country 2030 Agenda Forum held on 28 November. President Pradales emphasised the following aspects:

- Complete conviction and agreement as to the goal set by the United Nations to build a fairer world. In the Basque Country we believe that stateless nations and local institutions play a fundamental role in addressing global challenges, since these are issues which directly affect us at the local level.
- Peace, human rights, solidarity and equality are fundamental principles for the Basque Country. As demonstrated by our communal nature and the neighbourhood culture of auzolan, which likewise lays the foundation for collaborative governance. By joining forces, the Basque Government, Provincial Authorities and City Councils have launched fruitful projects, in partnership with social organisations. But that is not enough. Now is the time to take a quantum leap forward.
- We need a step change in democratic regeneration, given the troubles currently facing democracies around the world. This goes hand-in-hand with another dangerous trend: the links binding us together as a community are weakening; individualism and selfishness are gaining ground; and public debate is losing out to misinformation and fake news.
- We must strengthen our institutions through transparency and exemplary action. Our response must be more democracy and more Europe. We need to react effectively to the needs of societies and a world of increasing complexity. Hence the importance of strengthening collaborative governance, involving citizens in the design, launch and appraisal of public policy. We need to root out party-political rationales and consolidate sincere dialogue, based on respect, in pursuit of agreement. We must in turn promote critical and committed citizenship; freedom and responsibility; autonomy and a spirit of community.

Shared support and governance

Our model of governance and working methodology are essential if we are to strike the right balance in fulfilling sustainable development. The "how" has a decisive impact on the outcomes of the "what". The scale and depth of the challenges raised by the SDGs demand effective partnership and cooperation strategies.

The fundamental instrument for 2030 Agenda governance is the Basque Country 2030 Agenda Forum (Multi-agent Social Transition and 2030 Agenda Forum), set up in 2021. This body drives shared governance of the 2030 Agenda across all Basque institutions and social agents.

The Forum's **stable working platforms** comprise a Plenary, a Standing Committee and 5 Working Parties (Governance, Bultzatu 2050 Basque Country Urban Agenda, Social Transformation, Energy-Climate Transformation and Economic-Digital Transformation), as well as the Guneak initiative, the platform for the involvement of academia, companies and other civil society agents.

Themed working teams are likewise organised to develop specific topics in collaboration. Over the course of 2024 the initiative involved:

- A themed team to address improvements to the Basque 2030 Agenda Indicator System. This same team likewise began work to standardise criteria and methodologies in connection with specific localisation instruments, such as the Local Voluntary Reports and the Budgets with an SDG perspective, while also extending these to the municipal level.
- A themed team to analyse the current situation and identify areas for improvement with regard to disaster risk prevention and reduction strategy and governance in the Basque Country.

The institutions and organisations that make up the Forum have continued through their active participation and specific contributions to feed into this initiative in shared governance and partnership. Around **150 people representing 125 institutions and organisations took part over the course of 2024** in the different stable working platforms of the Basque Country 2030 Agenda Forum, attending a total of **12 meetings** (2 of the Plenary, 1 of the Standing Committee, 8 at the different Working Parties and 1 at Guneak). It should be emphasised that the functioning of the Forum was in 2024 shaped by the elections to the Basque Parliament (April 2024), which meant that fewer meetings were held.

We set out below the most significant activities and achievements seen in 2024:

- Specific handling of the Gender Equality SDGs.
- Declaration dedicated to the Summit of the Future and SDG 16 (Peace).
- Declaration dedicated to strengthening democracy within the context of the 2030 Agenda.
- Design of the Social Innovation and 2030 Agenda Plan for the period 2024-2028.

The 2021-2024 Priorities Programme

The "Basque Programme of 2030 Agenda Priorities" constitutes the 2021-2024 action plan of the Basque Government with regard to the 2030 Agenda.

This programme's mission has been to promote the culture of a social contract through the 2030 Agenda, linked to 4 goals: contribute to greater internal social cohesion; participate in international best efforts for peace, justice and sustainability; promote policy consistency; and adopt the 2030 Agenda as a commitment to drive transformative priorities.

- The programme included 4 working priorities:
- · Social outreach and citizen engagement.
- Coordination and collaborative governance.
- Alignment, development and evaluation.
- Catalyst commitments and flagship projects.

The 7 flagship projects were implemented as planned, generating impacts not only in the Basque Country but also at the international level, since several of them were linked to development cooperation promoted by the Basque Country.;

The Bultzatu 2050 Urban Agenda

The Bultzatu 2050 Basque Country Urban Agenda comprises efforts for the systematisation, strategic focusing and consistency of public policy intended to improve the potential of the Basque Country in offering opportunities for economic growth, sustainability and social cohesion. Bultzatu 2050 has been built and is mapped out on the basis of prior planning exercises, focused from the perspective of the challenges and potentialities of the urban territory of the Basque Country, providing a reference framework for urban and local policies across the territory as a whole, at the levels of the Basque Government, Provincial Authorities and Municipalities.

Bultzatu 2050 fits into the international and European framework, drawing on efforts already under way to build sustainable and economically prosperous territorial development. The goal of Bultzatu 2050 is to bring about inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable cities and villages, where no one is left behind, and to do so with a view to the year 2050, aware that given the inherent characteristics of the dimensions addressed (socioeconomic, energy, climate, territorial), the challenges to be dealt with are for the long term, albeit with a dynamic dimension which allows timings to be reviewed in the medium term. Bultzatu is aligned with the objectives established by UN Habitat and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), in particular with reference to Goal 11, and reflecting the Davos Declaration on a high-quality Baukultur for Europe. Bultzatu 2050 focuses on a distinctive, sustainable, harmonious city model, based on high-quality urban design, defining a framework for the consistency of urban sustainable development policies.

During 2024, the Working Party held meetings and the second monitoring report was presented, at the halfway stage of the period covered by the 2030 Agenda. The report conducts an in-depth evaluation of 2 of the strategic priorities of Bultzatu 2050:

- Cities on the move and the commitment to a new mobility.
- Innovative, smart cities, and the required balance of R&D and non-technological innovation, combining urban and human aspects.

Support for SDG localisation in Basque municipalities


The approval of the 2030 Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals by the UN in 2015 established a new reference framework for the implementation of sustainable development principles at Basque municipalities. Previously, for more than 20 years the local authorities in the Basque Country had adopted adhesion to the Aalborg Charter and Agenda 21 processes as instruments to progress towards more sustainable cities and municipalities.

Along the way, Udalsarea 2030 - Basque Network of Sustainable Municipalities, and EUDEL - Association of Basque Municipalities, have been coordinating efforts to lead the localisation of the SDGs at the local level in the Basque Country.

Over recent years, and within the context of the transition from Agenda 21 to the 2030 Agenda, Udalsarea 2030 has developed different tools and services focused on adapting the Sustainable Development Goals to the characteristics and reality of Basque municipalities and district entities in order to facilitate their implementation at the local level, above all the creation in 2015 of the guide "Local 2030 Agenda. How to address the Sustainable Development Goals at the local level", and the creation and facilitation of the **Local 2030 Agenda working parties**, with the aim of advising and accompanying local bodies in implementing the 2030 Agenda and creating a meeting point where the different agents involved in this process can share their experiences and lessons learned in adapting the 2030 Agenda at the local level.

Udalsarea 2030 has also promoted a **monitoring and evaluation model for local sustainable development plans and policies** focused on accountability, enabling entities to generate yearly **Local Voluntary Reports**. This monitoring and evaluation model is supported by a methodological guide, an online application (e-mugi), and an organisational support service to streamline the process.

This monitoring model serves to ascertain which Sustainable Development Goals are receiving the greatest attention at the local level in the Basque Country. The local actions currently planned in Basque municipalities suggest the following proportion (percentage of actions contributing to each SDG out of all actions undertaken):



Meanwhile, EUDEL (the Association of Basque Municipalities) is promoting other spheres of localisation, such as the **alignment of municipal budgets with the SDGs**, drawing on the "Practical guide for initial Municipal Budget Alignment with the SDGs", a guide devised to offer an initial response for those local authorities wishing to implement such alignment, above all from the perspective of budgetary education, and in order to present the outcome of the alignment through the required public communication campaigns.

In 2021, within the context of the involvement of Basque municipalities in the Basque 2030 Agenda, **15 collaborative municipal promotion projects were selected for the period 2021-2024**, incorporated as Basque 2030 Agenda projects. Development of these projects continued in 2024.

We should also highlight the participation of Basque municipalities in the **Council of Europe European Label of Governance Excellence (ELoGE)**, providing accreditation of the highest level of quality in local government, as the ultimate recognition at the European level of good governance and democratic innovation at a municipal government. Progress in terms of the ELoGE principles and indicators means improving the quality of governance proposed by SDGs 16 and 17.

The final document available is "Strategic framework and support tools to speed up localisation of the SDGs at Basque municipalities", which proposes a strategic framework and compiles the available tools to assist in this localisation.

The most significant aspect we would highlight from SDG localisation in Basque municipalities is that this comprises **a goal shared by practically all municipalities, irrespective of their size**. We would highlight the following as the most significant indicators:

- 225 municipalities are involved directly or through district entities in Udalsarea 2030, representing 90% of Basque municipalities, covering 97% of the Basque population.
- 72 Basque **local entities** (municipalities and district entities) **have in place or are in the process of drawing up their Local 2030 Agenda**.
- 28 Basque municipalities have a Local Voluntary Report on their progress towards the main sustainable development challenges at the local level.

Awareness-raising to foster active, conscious citizenship, committed to the process of transformation and sustainable human development

We would highlight the following initiatives and instruments within this strand:

Courses to understand the 2030 agenda

Beginner courses open free of charge, covering the 2030 Agenda and intended for any organisation or individual with an interest.

More than 500 people were trained during 2024.

"Gazte plaza" travelling exhibition on the 2030 agenda

Initiative of the EGK (Basque Country Youth Council) and the Basque Government, with the aim of increasing awareness of the SDGs and the 2030 Agenda among young people, through an exhibition, talks to address different topics covered by the SDGs, and fun activities.

This year the exhibition was staged in the municipalities of Zarautz, Trapagaran, Amurrio and Galdakao.

School 2030 agenda and training in 2030 agenda within the educational sphere

There is a 2030 Sustainability Education Strategy, which provides the framework for development of the School 2030 Agenda. The aim of the School 2030 Agenda is to educate empowered citizens with eco-social awareness, likewise giving students an active role in progressing towards increasingly sustainable municipalities.

Efforts were made during 2024 to generate new audiovisual teaching materials about the Agenda, intended for students in their final and penultimate years of compulsory secondary education.

Basque alliance for the SDGS

The Basque Alliance for the SDGs includes 5 commitments with 5 practical implications, one of which is progressively to apply the "2030 Agenda development guide for companies and organisations" within each entity.

By the end of 2024, the Alliance had a total of 103 associate entities.

Good food practice guide

Guide intended for members of the public wishing to contribute to the SDGs through their food choices, drawn up by the Basque Culinary Center.

Other socialisation initiatives

Other socialisation initiatives, such as the BBK SDG Eguna.

Generation of innovation and skills among agents on the ground to incorporate sustainability at their organisations and prepare for multi-actor collaboration

Notable initiatives include the following:

Postgraduate in strategic integration, monitoring and communication of the 2030 Agenda and SDGS

Qualification resulting from cooperation among the 3 universities within the Basque university system: EHU/UPV, Deusto and Mondragon Unibertsitatea.

2030 Agenda development guide for companies and organisations

Tool to assist companies and organisations in developing their commitment to the 2030 Agenda and positioning themselves with a view to SDG progress, based on conducting a situational diagnosis and defining a pathway for shared improvements, with a flexible and progressive approach to the transformations that the SDGs call for.

BBK kuna, home of the SDGS

Social innovation platform involving various agents linked to the SDGs to offer the society of Bizkaia solutions in response to future challenges.

Multilingual 2030 agenda dictionary

Dictionary with 3,600 entries in Basque, Spanish and English, with information available via the website www.2030agendahiztegia.eus.

Attraction of public and private investment towards territorial transformation roadmaps

The most notable initiatives in this sphere would include:

"Basque Country sustainable bond" initiative

2024 saw the launch and conclusion of the eighth issue of these bonds for a total of 600 million euros, almost 7 times oversubscribed (the requests received totalled 4.013 billion euros). 70% were placed with international accounts, 24% with Spanish investors and 6% with investors from the Basque Country.

This investment is assigned to the funding of social projects and green projects.

Euskadi Next

The Basque Country Next 2021-2026 Programme represents a commitment to economic transformation and the development of the Basque Country's strengths in the use of European funds derived from the Recovery and Resilience Facility (RRF). The operational strands are:

- Personal health and care.
- · Lifelong learning.
- Renewable energy generation.
- Sustainable mobility.
- Digitalisation and innovation of administrations and companies.

- Urban habitat.
- Natural habitat and prevention of natural disasters.

Circular economy.

Euskadi Next brings together specific projects which could represent a total investment impact of more than 18 billion euros, including European funds and other public and private finance associated with the projects.

Euskadi Next includes the development of the Basque Country 2022-2024 Strategic Investments Plan, an inter-institutional plan of the Basque Government and Provincial Authorities with a budget of 528 million euros, and the aim of promoting major transformative projects linked to the sustainable development of the Basque Country.

System of indicators

The Basque Country has a system of indicators to allow continuous monitoring of the degree of fulfilment of the Sustainable Development Goals and Targets.

This Indicator System began with a statistical operation undertaken by EUSTAT-Basque Institute of Statistics, generating a considerable number of indicators the methodology for which has been standardised with all central statistical bodies of the Autonomous Regions of Spain. Following on from this, within the context of the Basque Country 2030 Agenda Forum, collaborative efforts have been made to extend this indicator system, focusing above all on identifying indicators connected with those Goals and Targets for which less information is currently available. Major efforts are likewise being made to increase the number of indicators providing data with a breakdown at the municipal and/or provincial level.

By the end of 2024, the System had x indicators, distributed as follows:

Public budgets and procurement with an SDG perspective

Public budgets with an SDG perspective

Different Basque public institutions are developing initiatives to incorporate the SDG perspective within their budgets (the Basque Government has done so since the 2024 Budget), while others intend to embark on this operational approach in the near future.

The plan is to work on the development of a methodology serving to standardise the budgetary alignment of all institutions.

Public procurement with an SDG perspective

A report on public procurement with an SDG perspective has been drawn up, including an analysis of the current situation in the Basque Country and reference points drawing on good practice at the state and international level.

This report will provide the basis for a future project intended to promote the use of social and environmental clauses in the procurement processes of Basque Public Authorities.

Active participation in international initiatives and collaboration with other regions

The key initiatives over the course of 2024 include:

Participation at the summit of the future

The Basque Country took part at the parallel event organised by the United Nations 2030 Coalition "Shaping local pathways for a more equitable, sustainable and secure future for all. Localising the Pact for the Future", which took place on 21 September in New York.

The Basque Country argued to **localise the Pact for the Future**, emphasising the importance of guaranteeing a multilateral system of governance involving combined efforts by all levels of government, based on diversity, and with multi-agent governance in the case of the Basque Country.

Basque Country, headquarters of the Local 2030 coalition

The Local 2030 Coalition has consolidated its collaboration with the Basque Country through the **launch of its office in Bilbao during 2024**.

This step will serve to extend its impact and progress towards the next phase: foster connections to achieve systemic transformations and jointly define success in the localisation of the SDGs. This includes adding the SDGs to key global agendas such as the Conference on Financing for Development and COP30. Looking ahead to the future, the focus is on effectively financing and monitoring localisation, with tools such as the Localisation Marker and local voluntary reviews focused on action.

Priority will likewise be given to decentralised cooperation, with the Basque model serving as an example to extend good practice internationally, reasserting the commitment to collaboration and firm alliances as essential resources in driving more inclusive and transformative sustainable development.

In February, meanwhile, Bilbao hosted the Coalition Retreat, attended by the directors of the 15 UN agencies, where they worked together to draw up the draft management plan for the next 3 years

Presentation of the proposal to join the network of un Local2030 HUBS

This presentation was made within the context of the World Urban Forum (WUF) held in Cairo in November.

The Hub will provide resources, knowledge, strategies and innovative solutions to benefit other cities and regions around the world, with the focus on strengthening the democratic system, emphasising:

- Collaborative governance, understood as a factor in territorial competitiveness.
- Cultural and linguistic diversity.
- Funding of localisation through public-private partnership.

Culmination of the case study conducted by the OECD

The case study "A Territorial Approach to the Sustainable Development Targets in the Basque Country" has now been completed by the OECD Centre for Entrepreneurship, SMEs, Regions and Cities.

Incorporation of SDG 18 Linguistic and Cultural Diversity

The document "Incorporation of Goal 18 within the Basque Country 2030 Agenda. Dissemination of targets for Goal 18 - Linguistic and Cultural Diversity" was approved in late 2023, leading to initial inclusion of these targets within the planning and dissemination activities of numerous Basque institutions.

The document will be completed in 2025 through a sectoral participatory process, with an international roadmap being drawn up to allow this goal to be integrated within the global 2030 Agenda.


Basque contribution to the global 2030 Agenda in 2024: detailed vision of each SDG


- Income Guarantee and Minimum Living Income Programme (Basque Government). Monthly economic allowance to cover the basic needs of individuals and families comprising household units who do not have sufficient resources to meet the expenses associated with basic needs.
- **Social Emergency Grants** (Basque Government and Local Authorities). Non-periodic economic allowances intended for those belonging to a household unit with insufficient resources to meet specific expenses, on a regular or extraordinary basis, as required to prevent, avoid or alleviate situations of social exclusion.
- **Initiative to combat energy and food poverty** (Basque Government). Urgent coverage for the basic needs of individuals and families without access to the resources needed to purchase food and basic toiletries, and to facilitate the payment of electricity, water and gas bills for families outside the system.
- Supplementary Housing and Subjective Right to Housing Allowance (Basque Government). Economic grants for access to housing or to provide decent and appropriate housing for household units without access to sufficient resources.
- "Social Energy Payment" Programme (Basque Government). Grant programme to offset energy expenses incurred by the most vulnerable consumers through the use of heating, hot water and cooking.
- **Special Energy Poverty Grants** (Bilbao City Council). Economic grants intended for household units that cannot cover sufficient energy service expenses to meet their domestic needs, or where the proportional part of their income spent on energy bills is excessive.
- Adhesion to the National Zero Child Poverty Alliance of the High-Commissioner for Child Poverty (Vitoria-Gasteiz City Council). The purpose of the Alliance is to change the course of child poverty, by forging agreements among key actors for the eradication of this problem.
- **Basque Social Pact for Migration** (inter-institutional). Joint commitment to harmonious co-existence, championing ethical positions regarding immigration.

Census and diagnosis of people in a situation of serious residential exclusion (Basque Government and Local Authorities). An initiative aiming to quantify the number of people in a situation of serious residential exclusion, taking a specific night as the reference point, and furthermore aiming to ascertain and analyse the situation and characteristics of these people.

Elkar-EKIN, Social Inclusion Plan (Gipuzkoa Provincial Authority). A new Social Inclusion Plan driving the generation of new social and economic inclusion opportunities for people at risk of social exclusion, underpinning joined-up regional policies and developing a strategy of communication and awareness-raising as to social inclusion, to engage citizens.



- Lagun Guneak (Bilbao City Council). This programme lends greater dignity to family food distribution, offering these people a comprehensive support service, with customised responses and expert assistance.
- **GaztenekBerri Programme** (Basque Government and Provincial Authorities). Generational handover programme in the primary sector focusing on the sustainability of farms.
- Experimental organic crop estate in Eskalmendi (Álava Provincial Authority).
- Basaldea Centre, training and entrepreneurship in regenerative agriculture (Vitoria-Gasteiz City Council).
- BIHAR Programme (Álava Provincial Authority). Action programme focused on supporting and creating a network with young people at its heart, helping them to see the potential and opportunities offered by the primary sector, so as to transform social perspectives and guarantee a brighter future for agriculture and livestock farming.
- **Suspertze Plana** (Bizkaia Provincial Authority). Comprehensive primary sector support programme, including the creation of a farming bank to facilitate generational transition, a comprehensive handover plan to encourage entrepreneurship, rebates applied to water fees and a tax discount.
- **Vitoria-Gasteiz Agri-food Strategy** (Vitoria-Gasteiz City Council). Its aim is to design and test the development of a system to increase the production, marketing and sale of fresh, local produce according to farming practices based on regenerative agriculture.

- Involvement in the European Al4SoilHealth project to create digital infrastructure to monitor and predict agricultural soil health indicators (Basque Government).
- Intervention programme comprising direct payments financed by the European Agricultural Guarantee Fund (EAGF), included within the Common Agricultural Policy (Basque Government).
- Basic Material Assistance Programme (Basque Government): European programme with the aim of alleviating social vulnerability, above all among families with children, using digital cards to be exchanged at different supermarkets.



Its fundamental aim is to analyse and understand the ageing process among the population of Álava; optimal development of full, active and healthy ageing, and personal autonomy; and a response to the problems associated with old age.
- Euskadi Lagunkoia, age-friendly municipalities (Basque Government and Local Authorities). An initiative intended to encourage older people to play an active role in the municipalities of the Basque Country, and to shape more age-friendly towns and villages.
- Nagusi Agenda (Basque Government) Basque Governance Strategy for older people, based on the design of a collaborative governance model.
- Zaindoo: (Basque Government) Carer family support app

- **Berria Active Viewpoint** (Bilbao City Council). A programme to identify older people living alone and lacking family or social support networks, to perform the required preventive tasks through municipal social services.
- Activate Your Neighbourhood (Vitoria-Gasteiz City Council). A programme establishing ties among older people experiencing vulnerability and/or fragility, and involving the general public so as to combat loneliness.
- **New care home model** (Bizkaia Provincial Authority). Improved care for dependent persons at provincial care homes through the progressive implementation of a model based on shared housing units.
- **Zaintza Herrilab scaling hub** (Gipuzkoa Provincial Authority). This hub aims to scale up the innovations driven by local care ecosystems across the region as a whole, through a learning network and the transfer of current pilot schemes with a proven impact.
- **Hariak** (Gipuzkoa Provincial Authority). Strategy to combat loneliness and foster prevention and intervention projects for different situations of loneliness, strengthen interpersonal relations and social ties (mainly inter-generational), and facilitate public dialogue to overcome the social stigma associated with situations of loneliness.
- **Araba is Ready** (Álava Provincial Authority). Initiative to promote a collective construction strategy to combat the loneliness suffered by many older people.
- Centre for research into the ageing of people with intellectual disability (Álava Provincial Authority). Research and innovation centre to improve the quality of and autonomy of those with intellectual disability and neurodevelopmental disorders (NDs) as they age in Álava, by building an inclusive ecosystem to promote collaboration and knowledge exchange.
- **Mugiment** (Basque Government and Local Authorities). A collaborative project to achieve an active Basque society. It combines initiatives focused on promoting physical activity and combating sedentary lifestyles, prioritising measures to encourage people to give up their inactivity.





This project aims to identify, define and model how to build a local care network based on a lifecentred paradigm, through public services and community networks, forging the required alliances with the different agents involved in the care system.

- Inter-institutional Agreement to Improve Care for Female Victims of Male Violence (inter-institutional). Collective management of forestry heritage and a sustainability-based model serves to promote the integrated management of woodland assigned by the owners, implementing a sustainable forestry management model with a commitment to the bioeconomy and the use of timber as a commodity.
- Improvements to the Green Infrastructure Network of Gipuzkoa and restoration of degraded areas (Gipuzkoa Provincial Authority and Local Authorities). Projects to improve the environmental quality of municipally owned public land, in both urban and rural areas, increasing the ecological functionality of the restored areas and their resilience in response to the impacts of climate change.



- **HEI Open Citizenship School** (Vitoria-Gasteiz City Council). A forum and training platform which aims to improve and increase citizens' motivation and skills, encouraging them to play a more prominent role in municipal management.
- Institutional integrity systems (all institutions).
- Bizkaia Gertu, network of district citizen helpdesks (Bizkaia Provincial Authority).
- Office for coordination and fulfilment of Social Clauses in Procurement (Bizkaia Provincial Authority).






Annex I

Report on the alignment of the basque government's 2025 Budget with the 2030 agenda's süstainable development goals





Introduction

This report seeks to analyse the Basque Government's 2025 budget in order to establish its degree of alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the 2030 Agenda; this will allow its figures to be linked to the different SDGs.

Thus, a total of 111 budgetary programmes classified into 26 expenditure functions impacting the 17 SDGs of the 2030 Agenda (see list of functions and programmes in the Annex) have been aligned; totalling 584 direct application (resources of the budgetary programme aimed directly at compliance of some of the SDG goals) and indirect application (when the resources of the budgetary programme are aimed indirectly at compliance of the SDG target) impacts.

Methodology

The following filtering was performed for each of the budgetary programmes of the consolidated budget (111 in total):

- 1. The goals and activities of each budgetary programme, along with its associated type of expenditure.
- 2. Those goals and activities have been contrasted with those of the SDGs.
- 3. Coincidence detection was used to determine whether there is an impact on any or several SDGs, given that the nature of the expenditure may be impacting more than one SDG at the same time.
- 4. The distribution of budgets by items of expenditure was used to distinguish between the direct application impacts and indirect application impacts. In general, the starting point has been the assumption that the direct application impacts occur through the items in chapters 4, 6 and 7, and the indirect application impacts through the items in the other chapters. However, given the specific nature of the budgetary programmes, the expenditure items in Chapters 1, 2 or 8 were also considered when calculating the direct application impacts.
- 5. In the case of those budgetary programmes impacting SDG 16 and SDG 17, a distribution was performed with a lower weighting compared to the other SDGs.





Number of Functions aligned with each SDG







Conclusions

- **1-High budgetary coverage** of the SDGs: a total of 584 impacts of the budgetary programmes affecting all SDGs have been recorded; there distribution ranges from the 10 programmes affecting SDG 15 (Life on Land) to the 73 programmes affecting SDG 17 (Partnerships for the goals).
- **2-Versatility** of the budgetary programmes: practically all the functions are aligned with at least 2 SDGs, with the most frequent range between 3 and 7 SDGs. Furthermore, 94% of the budgetary programmes are aligned with two or more SDGs.
- **3-High degree of alignment** of the budget **with the triple bottom line (economic, social and environmental)** of sustainable development: 46% of the budget is aimed at ensuring satisfactory and prosperous lives in harmony with nature; 32% is used in the fight against poverty and to guarantee the dignity and equality of people, and 5% to protect natural resources and the climate for future generations.
- **4-Relevant role of institutional SDGs:** the cross-cutting nature of SDGs 16 and 17 reflects the leadership that the Basque Government assumes in achieving the SDGs.
- **5-High synergies** between the SDG 8 and 9, driving growth and generation of wealth, and the other social and environmental SDGs.



25 September 2015, the 193 countries in the United Nations adopted the Sustainable Development Agenda 2030 with 17 goals and 176 targets that encompass economic, social, and environmental spheres around the world. To monitor the Agenda 2030, the UN General Assembly approved the Global Indicator Framework in July 2017. This consists of 248 unique global indicators governed by the principles of universality, integration, and participation.

Eustat-Basque Statistics Institute is fully committed to the core role that the UN General Assembly ascribes to official statistics in its Resolution 71/313. After approval of the Basque Statistics Plan, as the body responsible for the statistical system of the Autonomous Community of the Basque Country, it started up in 2019 statistics for the Sustainable Development Agenda 2030 indicators. The objective is to provide different social players with a battery of statistical indicators, aligned with the framework established by the United Nations, for constant monitoring of the degree of compliance with the goals and targets.

The platform for dissemination of the Sustainable Development Agenda 2030 indicators for the Autonomous Community of the Basque Country by Eustat was set up in 2020. Its clear aim is to comprehensively collate all sustainable development indicators corresponding to its geographical scope at the different regional levels: the Basque Country and its Provinces (Araba / Álava, Bizkaia, and Gipuzkoa), and municipal groupings.

With graphs and the latest data available, this document attached to the Voluntary Multi-Level Agenda 2030 Monitoring Report for the Basque Country provides the statistical indicators currently included on Eustat's indicator platform to monitor the 17 Sustainable Development Goals and 176 targets. We currently calculate 352 indicators, providing information on 125 of the 248 global indicators. 91 indicators are broken down by gender, 69 at municipal level, and 120 by historical region.

The platform is under constant development and review, thanks to Eustat's work in close cooperation with other statistics offices and generators of official statistics, as well as key social agents in the Basque Country in coordination with the General Secretariat of Communication and Social Innovation of the Basque Government.

The short-term challenges Eustat is facing include providing statistical series to report properly all the United Nations' global indicators applicable to society in the Autonomous Community of the Basque Country, as well as constantly disaggregating all the indicators by geographical region, sex, age groups, and other parameters to comply with the principle of leaving no one behind. The continuous inclusion of statistical series furthermore encourages us to undertake the required process of enlarging the platform, in line in all cases with UN directives, to facilitate the monitoring of the 2030 Agenda within the context of the Basque Country.








Indicator 1.5.2 Direct economic loss attributed to disasters in relation to global gross domestic product (GDP)










Indicator 3.2.2 Neonatal mortality rate




Indicator 3.4.2 Suicide mortality rate

































Net official development assistance of the autonomous and local public administrations as a proportion of GDP. Percentage








