

Protecting Climate-Resilient Coral Reefs: A High-Level Commitment

At a historic high-level event co-hosted by Papua New Guinea, the Wildlife Conservation Society, the World Wide Fund for Nature, and The Nature Conservancy, eleven governments launched the first-ever political commitment to protect climate-resilient coral reefs.

Signatories commitment to

- Integrate coral reef conservation into national biodiversity and climate strategies, including NBSAPs, NDCs, and relevant development plans, ensuring alignment with the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework and the Paris Agreement.
- Prioritize climate-resilient reefs within 30x30 commitments by identifying and protecting reefs most likely to persist and serve as recovery sources for the future.
- Strengthen national coral reef action plans and monitoring systems, building on existing mechanisms to reduce local threats, measure progress, and guide adaptive management.
- Enact and enforce policies to reduce land-based pollution, eliminate destructive and illegal fishing, and manage coastal development to minimize cumulative stress on reef ecosystems.
- Mobilize financing and build capacity, with emphasis on community leadership,
- Indigenous and traditional knowledge, and technology transfer.
- Partner with Indigenous people and local communities, as well as other stakeholders, to ensure that coral reef solutions are equitable, inclusive, and grounded in place-based stewardship.
