

- Aligns municipal priorities with national & global development frameworks

















Local Development Planning & the SDGs



Our Integrated Development Plans (IDPs) are our most powerful planning tool. By aligning them with the SDGs, we ensure our development is inclusive, measurable, and globally relevant.

How to Integrate SDGs into IDPs:

- Map IDP priorities to SDG targets (e.g., water = SDG 6, sanitation = SDG 3)
- Use local data to identify gaps
- Involve communities to ensure no one is left behind













Budgeting for the SDGs



A plan without a budget is a wish. If we truly want to achieve the SDGs, our municipal budgets must speak the language of sustainability, equity, and accountability.

SDG-Responsive Budgeting:

- Tag budgets to specific SDG goals
- Use performance-based and participatory budgeting approaches
- Ensure funding priorities reflect local needs and global commitments













Infrastructure Asset Management



Infrastructure is not just about building, it's about managing, maintaining, and adapting to ensure services reach our people sustainably. This is a critical SDG enabler.

SDG Links

- Sustainable infrastructure underpins SDG 9 (Industry, Innovation, Infrastructure), SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities), and SDG 13 (Climate Action)
- Embrace green, resilient infrastructure
- Track asset conditions digitally and plan for lifecycle maintenance













Voluntary Local Reviews (VLRs)



VLRs are more than a reporting tool. They are a chance to tell your municipality's development story, backed by evidence and aligned with international standards.

Why VLRs Matter:

- A localised version of national SDG reporting
- Helps municipalities track progress, identify challenges, and celebrate success
- Encourages transparency, citizen engagement, and global recognition













UN Sustainable Development Group (UNSDG)/ Agenda 2063



The UN Sustainable Development Group (UNSDG) has identified six key "transitions" areas that are critical for accelerating progress towards the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. These transitions focus on areas where policy interventions and strategic investments can produce compounding benefits across multiple Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Aligning VLRs with Key Development Agendas



Development Framework	Key Focus Areas	Integration with IDPs and VLRs
Agenda 2030 (SDGs)	17 SDGs with 169 targets focusing on poverty eradication, economic growth, sustainability, and inclusivity.	VLRs track local progress on SDGs and integrate findings into IDPs, ensuring alignment between municipal policies and global targets.
Africa Agenda 2063	A continental blueprint for Africa's socio- economic transformation, including aspirations for sustainable development, infrastructure, and governance.	Municipalities contribute to Africa's long-term goals by integrating Agenda 2063 aspirations (e.g., smart cities, green growth) into IDPs and linking them to SDG progress.
National Development Plan (NDP) 2030	South Africa's long-term vision for eliminating poverty, reducing inequality, and building a capable state.	IDPs serve as local implementation frameworks for NDP objectives. VLRs provide data-driven insights to measure municipal contributions to national targets.
New Urban Agenda (NUA)	A global roadmap for sustainable urbanisation, emphasising resilient cities, housing, and participatory governance.	IDPs incorporate urban planning, climate resilience, and inclusive growth strategies in line with NUA principles, with VLRs ensuring progress monitoring.













Why Integrate SDGs into Municipal Planning and Budgeting?



- **Alignment with National Priorities**: SDGs are aligned with South Africa's national development framework, including the National Development Plan (NDP) and Medium-Term Strategic Framework (MTSF).
- **Improved Service Delivery**: Integration of SDGs ensures more sustainable, inclusive, and equitable service delivery at the local level.
- Long-Term Sustainability: Aligning SDGs with planning and budgeting ensures that local development is sustainable, addressing both current and future generations' needs.

Steps to Integrate SDGs into Municipal Planning and Budgeting



Step 1: Align SDGs with Local Development Plans

 Ensure that the municipality's Integrated Development Plan (IDP) and budgeting processes reflect the SDGs.

Step 2: Set Clear SDG Targets and Indicators

• Break down SDGs into localized targets with clear metrics to measure progress in key areas (e.g., health, education, environment).

Step 3: Strengthen Data Systems

 Invest in data collection and management systems to monitor and evaluate SDG progress at the municipal level.

Step 4: Mobilise Resources

• Identify funding sources, both domestic and international, to finance SDG-aligned initiatives.

Step 5: Monitor and Report Progress

 Implement a regular monitoring and reporting system to track progress toward SDGs and adjust strategies as needed.

Practical Steps for Municipalities



The journey begins with one step. You don't have to do everything at once start by mapping your IDP, engaging your teams, and building toward your first VLR.

- 1. Conduct an SDG mapping of IDPs
- 2. Establish an SDG Coordination Task Team
- 3. Integrate SDG targets into SDBIPs & KPIs
- 4. Use digital tools for asset tracking
- 5. Pilot a VLR start small, build incrementally













Benefits of Mainstreaming SDGs



- Improved service delivery and planning
- Attracts donor/investment opportunities
- Enhances governance and transparency
- Aligns with NDP 2030, SADC vision 2050, Agenda 2063 and global commitments (UN Agenda 2030)
