
Survey Results - Major Groups and other Stakeholders Briefing Days

In a survey, participants of the Major Groups and other Stakeholders briefing days were asked to evaluate the event's format, content and execution. In total, 44 participants provided feedback on the briefing days, 55% of which attended both briefing days, with the other 45% only attending the second briefing day. Among those taking part in the survey, the largest share belonged to Non-Governmental Organisations (57%). A majority of the remaining participants represented the Major Groups: Children and Youth (9%), Women (9%), Farmers (7%), Academia (5%), Local Authorities (5%), and Indigenous People (2%). In addition there was participation on behalf of the United Nations and other international organisations (2%). Absent were participants of Business and Industry, Governments, the Scientific and Technological Community, and Workers and Trade Unions.

The main reasons for attendance in order are provided below:

- Obtain information on and being prepared for the ensuing UN sessions and side-events;
- Network
- Learn about critical issues related to the post-Rio+20 and post-2015 processes
- Propagate stakeholder interests

1. Assessment of event format and execution:



Attendees were asked to rate the event with respect to its format. They could choose between four different grades (excellent, good, fair, and poor) in their evaluation of the performance of speakers, the general design and execution of the programme, and the facilitation and quality of the dialogue following the speeches and presentations.

Overall, attendees seem pleased with the speakers and the overall quality of the programme, but the format of the dialogue with the audience could have been to a higher standard.

2. Assessment of content

The survey also gathered information on the content of the events asking participants to point out elements of the session, which they found useful, useless or redundant. The most frequent responses are summarised in descending order in the table below:

Finally, the questionnaire inquired about topics that had been neglected during the two briefing days. Further, participants provided suggestions on the desired format of future briefing days. In addition the right hand column provides a list of general suggestions. All items are ordered based on frequency.
