- On March 2016 Filantropi Indonesi a in partnership with the UN Global Compact Indonesia, the Indonesia Business Council for Sustainable Development and the Indonesia Chamber of Commerce initiated the Philanthropy & Business Communication Forum SDGs for a better Indonesia
- This Forum proactively initiated discussions with Ministry of National Development Planning (BAPPENAS) and SDG National Secretariat about lessons learned on MDGs and how philanthropy and business can contribute to the achievements of SDGs.



Challenges for collaboration identified

- Presidential Decree in Indonesia
- International partnership restrictions
- Tax incentive regulation
- Changing shape of global financial flows: philanthropy brings strengths but should not be seen as a gap filler for Official Development Assistance
