Name of Commitment: Denmark's commitment to scaling up and mobilising financing for development and climate	Contact person: Jakob Tvede (jaktve@um.dk)
Brief description of steps taken on implementation, progress made and/or lessons learned: The government of Denmark has decided to provide an annual capital contribution of DKK 500 million (USD 75 mil.) in the years 2024-2030 to Impact Fund Denmark (i.e. the Danish Investment Fund for Developing Countries, IFU). The main intention with the new financing is to increase Impact Fund Denmark's contribution to climate finance. Denmark will double Impact Fund Denmark's investment budget and triple its contribution to climate finance from current annual DKK 2 billion (USD 300 million) to DKK 5-7 billion (USD 900 million) towards 2030 through the capital contribution, a significant mobilisation of private investments, and access to financing from the Central Bank of Denmark. Denmark, together with the Nordic Governments, leads the Investment Mobilization Collaboration Alliance (IMCA), which aims to raise concessional catalytic donor financing in large scale with the purpose of attracting investments from institutional and other private investors through fund collaboration.

Brief description of steps taken on implementation, progress made and/or lessons learned: Denmark supported the subsidy account of IMF's Poverty Reduction and Growth Trust (PRGT) with a grant totaling SDR 19 million (app. DKK 174 million) in 2023 and 2024. Further, Denmark has provided an additional loan frame for PRGT of SDR 150 million (app. DKK 1.4 billion), thereby increasing the total Danish loan frame to PRGT to SDR 950 million (app. DKK 8.6 billion).

Brief description of steps taken on implementation, progress made and/or lessons learned:	
Denmark remains strongly committed to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda and the SDGs. Denmark has just published an updated national SDG action plan, reflecting the priorities of the current government. The action plan provides an overview of Denmark's progress on all SDGs and focuses on the SDGs where progress is still needed to reach the goals by 2030.

Brief description of steps taken on implementation, progress made and/or lessons learned:	
Denmark is still committed to living up to the UN target of delivering 0.7% of GNI in Official Development Assistance today and in the future. For instance, Denmark has established a budget balancing mechanism to ensure the allocation of exactly 0,70 pct. of GNI over a three-year period despite fluctuations in e.g. GNI or in-donor refugee costs during finance years.
